Message from Our CEO



Dear Friends.

It is with tremendous pride and gratitude that we present Maryville's annual report, highlighting 75 years of transformational growth. From our roots planted in a single building in Williamstown in 1949 providing inpatient substance use disorder treatment, Maryville now provides inpatient and community-based prevention, education, treatment, and recovery support through five physical sites for over 9,000 adults, children and families a year on their road to recovery from substance use, mental health and associated physical health conditions.

In 2024, Maryville Addiction Treatment Center became Maryville Integrated Care. Our new name reflects our dedication to a holistic treatment approach, addressing multiple needs of clients simultaneously. We combine substance use treatment, mental health care, medical services, and support systems to address a broad spectrum of challenges our clients face. Programs are designed to promote lasting recovery and overall well-being.

During this past year, Maryville expanded its peer recovery supports, assisting over 1,100 people with housing, and over 4,200 people with treatment assessment and referral, obtaining identification documentation and food stamps, employment and education, transportation to medical and social service appointments, family reunification, social supports and other tools essential for long term health and wellness. 561 people engaged with our alumni program this year which expanded through our partnership with the Holman Foundation. Partnerships with Camden area homeless shelters expanded our reach to those needing physician assessment and access to medications for opioid use disorder. 2,200 people were served at our two Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) demonstration sites in Vineland and Turnersville this year. CCBHCs provide a more comprehensive range of integrated mental health, substance use disorder, and physical health assessments, education, treatment and care coordination with primary care and other partners. Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT), family services, transportation, housing and food bank connections, and vocational training are also included. Our adolescents referred through partnerships with area high schools for substance use and mental health treatment achieved 92% positive outcomes. Members of the LGBTQIA+ community engaged in our treatment programs achieved 84% stable employment, 96% stable housing, and 97% abstinence from police engagement during the year. Many of these clients also took advantage of our specialized care management services offered in partnerships with area hospitals. Our inpatient sites in Williamstown and Pemberton provided inpatient withdrawal management, long and short term residential medical, clinical and recovery supports for 3,127 clients, 95% of whom stated they gained the tools necessary to achieve improvements in long term health and wellness.

Maryville staff were recognized for their leadership of these programs with several awards from prestigious statewide organizations this year. Our LGBTQIA+ Program Director and Certified Peer Recovery Specialist (CPRS) won second place in the 2024 New Jersey Social Innovations Awards in the Services for Special Populations category. Maryville's Cumberland County Outpatient Recovery Court Liaison was honored by the New Jersey Recovery Court with the 2024 Recovery Court HERO award. And our CPRS Supervisor was recognized with the New Jersey Association of Mental Health and Addiction Agencies (NJAMHAA) 2024 Champion Peer Leader Award.

These are just a few of the milestones achieved this year through the dedication and passion of our physicians, nurses, counselors, care managers, recovery support and administrative staff who work tirelessly every day to deliver high quality, specialized health care and social supports. Together with the support of a mission driven board of directors and community stakeholders, we will continue to restore hope, health, and healing for those who come to us. Thank you for all you do to help us build stronger communities.

Who is Maryville?

Maryville was founded in 1949 by a Roman Catholic priest, A. Bennett Conway, as a retreat for rehabilitating alcoholic men. Maryville offered a supportive environment, where guests could be away from the daily requirements of life, to come together and work on themselves. Despite the religion of its founder, Maryville was non-sectarian from the start. A space for prayer and meditation was offered, but no masses were held. What began as a single space grew into multiple buildings including cottages, a workshop, and a chapel, built by the "colony's" own guests. The men were not forced to work; rather, there were two rules at Maryville. One was abstaining from alcohol and the other was attending a minimum of three AA meetings weekly. Most men opted to volunteer in some capacity. This act returned a sense of self-worth and productivity to many who had lost that in their lives. The average stay was three to four weeks, but guests could choose to stay longer. With dogs on the property that served as greeters, as well as geese, ducks, chickens, and guinea hens that inspired interest in nature, the colony was full of life.

It would be 18 years before Maryville opened its doors to women and expanded its services to include drug addiction treatment. Since then, Maryville has continued to evolve to meet the needs of its vast community. As we celebrate 75 years, we are grateful for the many ways this organization continues to serve those who need us most. Our four South Jersey treatment sites located

in Burlington, Cumberland, and Gloucester Counties, offer a diverse set of residential and outpatient substance use and mental health services. Our continuum of care encompasses medically monitored withdrawal management, short and long-term residential treatment, and IOP and outpatient, including specialty programs for LGBTQIA+ and Spanish-speaking communities, those with stimulant use disorders, and adolescents. Co-occurring gambling treatment is also offered in the inpatient and Vineland outpatient programs. Vital services such as Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT), peer recovery support, follow-up and aftercare, sober living placement, family services, and alumni services are intentionally folded in to support long-term recovery. And now that we have transitioned to Maryville Integrated Care, medical services can be accessed throughout our programs.

Licensed by the New Jersey Department of Human Services, accredited by CARF International, and a member of the National Association of Addiction Treatment Providers (NAATP), Maryville serves more than 9,000 individuals and families each year. Throughout its services, Maryville utilizes a holistic, person-centered approach that addresses an individual's multiple needs. Service delivery is culturally competent, traumainformed, strengths-based, and individually tailored to a client's needs and preferences.







Success Story: Fred Conover



By the winter of 1991, I was homeless, addicted to crack cocaine, and ready to give up on life. On January 21, 1991, I stumbled into Maryville Alcoholism Rehabilitation Center, broken and at rock bottom. That was the first day of my new life.

My journey to that low point began in a violent home. Between 1978 and 1981, I was sexually abused on multiple occasions by a male gym teacher during camping trips. I had no idea how to cope, so I turned inward...and then to drugs.

By the time I was 13, I was smoking cigarettes and weed. In my later teens, I was already doing acid, cocaine, speed, opiates, etc. I was able to hang out in bars, thanks to my alcoholic biological dad (who had become a friend of sorts once he allowed my stepfather to adopt me, and no longer had to pay child support).

Still, I clung to a dream I'd had since 6th grade...to join the United States Marine Corps. I enlisted in 1988 and began recruit training at Parris Island that December. I graduated on February 28th, 1989—just three days before my biological father was diagnosed with terminal pancreatic cancer. His diagnosis rocked me...bad. During my time in the Marines, I didn't use drugs, but I was regularly drunk and—because of this—in trouble for alcohol-related incidents.

I was spiraling again, except now there was structure and consequences.

My dad passed away on January 20, 1990. I took bereavement leave to attend the funeral—and spent most of it drinking, smoking weed, and doing coke. When I returned to base, I failed a drug test, and I was discharged on April 17, 1990.

This began a faster trip to bottom than I would have EVER thought possible. That summer I tried crack cocaine for the first time, and I was homeless by December... sleeping in cars and couch-surfing. I was on the streets...scared and quite alone.

On a billboard, I saw 1-800-ALCOHOL and called. They connected me with Maryville Alcoholism Rehabilitation Center in Williamstown, NJ and I entered treatment in January. Other than my clothes and a pack of Newports, I had ZERO belongings.

To say Maryville was a lifeline would be the biggest understatement I could make. They didn't just treat my addiction, they helped me heal from so much of my trauma. Between group sessions and one-on-one counseling, I talked about things I had buried (and medicated) for a long time. It was the very first time I told ANYBODY about my molestation, which began more healing than I could have ever imagined. I learned how to live without the need to hide from things and numb myself. I was finally able to really live life one day at a time. I could have NEVER dreamed this possible.

These tools still shape my life today. I learned to be honest...to stay accountable...and to positively deal with pain rather than running from it or numbing it. I left Maryville with the belief I could have a better life.

And better it DID become. I became a follower of Christ, which I would have never thought possible prior to becoming sober. I got married in 1992, and we built the kind of home I didn't have as a kid—filled with stability, laughter, and love. We raised two sons, both now grown. One of them is married with three sons of his own, which means I am now a grandfather (Poohpa) and loving every minute of it!

I started in the IT field in 1994, and even started my own side business in 1996. In much the same way I learned to trust in recovery through Maryville, I've earned the trust of my customers...by showing up, doing the work, and owning my actions.

I don't wake up in fear anymore. I wake up sober and no longer look over my shoulder wondering if I'm going to be shot, stabbed, or arrested. I look forward to playing with my grandkids, playing disc golf, going to church, hanging out with my best friend—my wife of almost 33 years!

To the staff and supporters of Maryville, I'd like them to know: you saved my life! Because of what you made possible in 1991, I've had 34 years of freedom, clarity, and purpose. I'm living proof that no one is too far gone—and the work that you do changes lives for good. Thank you!!

After witnessing family members of friends, co-workers and my own relatives struggle with addiction, I felt compelled to help ensure that everyone has access to the care they need. I've been deeply moved by Maryville's mission and the work they do in prevention, education, and both inpatient and outpatient treatment for substance use and mental health. Being part of the Leadership Council is an incredible opportunity to support a cause that touches so many in our community—because addiction knows no boundaries.

Organizational Timeline of Growth & Development

- **1949:** Father A. Bennett Conway opens Maryville in Williamstown, NJ to help alcoholic men work toward recovery.
- **1967:** Maryville begins serving women and expands services to include drug addiction treatment.
- **1979:** Maryville opens its first outpatient office in Westville, NJ.
- **1998:** Maryville opens a second outpatient location in Vineland, NJ.
- **2005:** Maryville receives approval to begin using Suboxone to assist with the substance use disorder treatment process.
- **2006:** Maryville becomes a treatment provider for New Jersey Drug Court programs.
- **2008:** Maryville becomes accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF).
- **2012:** Maryville partners with NJ State to pilot a co-occurring mental health services program.
- **2013:** Maryville partners with the New Jersey Division of Addiction Services to begin a Vivitrol pilot program in inpatient treatment.

The Williamstown Campus expands its medically monitored withdrawal management program.

- 2015: Maryville further expands its medically monitored withdrawal management program.The Westville outpatient office moves to Turnersville.
- **2017:** In partnership with Camden County, Maryville implements the Operation Save-a-Life initiative to provide 24-hour access to treatment for individuals who overdose.
- **2018:** Maryville assumes operation of Burlington County's residential substance abuse treatment facility for men, now known as Post House at Maryville, offering withdrawal management, short-term, and long-term residential treatment.
- **2019:** In partnership with Camden County, Maryville launches peer recovery support services, naloxone training, and a Family Education & Support Group.


Maryville's long-term residential treatment program doubles its capacity.

Maryville partners with the Burlington County Sheriff's Department and Health Department to launch Hope One mobile outreach services, aimed at opioid overdose prevention for hard-to-reach populations.

Maryville partners with the County of Camden to provide assessments, recovery support services, and treatment access from inside of two Camden City homeless shelters.

2020: RowanSOM and Maryville launch the SAMHSA-funded, "Minority AIDS Initiative for High-Risk Men of New Jersey" for African American and Hispanic men with substance use and/or co-occurring mental health disorders at risk for HIV or HIV positive.

2022: Maryville initiates outpatient services specific to the LGBTQIA+ community, Spanish speaking individuals, and those with a gambling addiction.

Maryville launches an evidence-based contingency management program to serve individuals with stimulant disorders.

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration (SAMHSA) awards Maryville a federal grant to become a Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic at Turnersville and Vineland.

Maryville becomes licensed to treat adolescents at its outpatient sites.

2023: Maryville hires its 25th peer recovery specialist in an ongoing effort to expand peer services.

RowanSOM and Maryville launch the SAMHSA-funded, "Minority AIDS Initiative for High-Risk Women of New Jersey" for African American and Hispanic women with substance use and/or co-occurring mental health disorders at risk for HIV or HIV positive.

2024: Maryville is awarded a state contract to double the capacity of its contingency management outpatient program.

Maryville partners with Burlington County to provide peer recovery specialist assistance 24/7 for overdose calls, with up to six weeks of follow-up services.

The New Jersey Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services funds Maryville to begin nurse care management and health education at the outpatient sites.

Maryville receives a state award to provide Medication Assisted Treatment Services (MAT) in Joseph's House of Camden homeless shelter.

Maryville is awarded a Holman Foundation grant to expand Alumni Services.

The New Jersey Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services awards Maryville a contract to expand residential peer recovery services.

Maryville receives state licenses to provide primary mental health services at both outpatient programs.

Maryville acquires its newest site, located in Voorhees, Camden County, and will begin providing treatment services at this location once licensed.

Maryville becomes a registered Harm Reduction Center and authorized by NJ Department of Health, Division of HIV, STD, and TB Services to offer harm reduction services.

- Maryville served more than 9,400 unduplicated individuals through inpatient and outpatient treatment, support services, and community programs.
- Maryville placed 900 clients in sober living housing throughout the state.

In client discharge surveys:

- 97% of Maryville clients stated they would recommend us to a friend or family member in need of services.
- 97% of Maryville clients felt they had gained the skills necessary to support their recovery.

At our Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC), where integrated substance use, mental health, and medical care is offered:

- 2,200 individuals received treatment and supportive services.
- 1,062 individuals obtained health insurance.
- 108 adolescents received treatment.

Through our LGBTQIA+ Outpatient Services:

- 96% of clients obtained/maintained stable housing.
- 84% of clients obtained/maintained stable employment.
- 97% of clients did not become involved with the criminal justice system

Our Turnersville outpatient program was honored as "Best Addiction Counseling/Recovery" through the Washington Township Chamber of Commerce's Best of Washington Township 2024 Awards.

Our LGBTQIA+ outpatient program won 2nd place in the NJ Social Innovations Awards for Innovation in Services for Special Populations. This category recognizes innovative strategies and services that improve health outcomes and quality of life.



Transforming Lives with Proven Results

Through Peer Recovery Support Services:

- We completed 52 community trainings on naloxone.
- 338 clients were able to obtain their Social Security card, birth certificate, driver's license, or another form of identification.
- 1,015 clients obtained General Assistance and/or SNAP food benefits.
- 211 clients received employment assistance.
- 136 clients obtained health insurance.
- 207 clients were able to schedule medical appointments.
- 2,245 clients were provided transportation to treatment and supportive services.
- 517 clients were linked to recovery resources such as support groups

Through Peer Recovery Support Services:

 We connected 260 residential clients to HIV education, testing and counseling.

Through our partnership with Camden County:

We offered resources for treatment to 3,293 individuals in homeless shelters, educating them on treatment options and providing the opportunity for placement.

Through our Family Education and Support Group:

We facilitated 43 group sessions, assisting 292 people to better understand and cope with their loved ones' addiction.

This award acknowledges and celebrates an individual who embodies the Recovery Court spirit, has gone above and beyond throughout the year, and is deserving of special recognition by their local County Recovery Court Team.

CPRS Supervisor **Delia Burgos** was presented with the Champion Peer Leader Award in the New Jersey Association of Mental Health & Addiction Agencies' (NJAMHAA) 2024 Courage and Compassion Awards. The Champion Peer Leader is an individual with lived experience who demonstrates extraordinary courage and determination to overcome the obstacles of substance use and/or mental health disorder to become a provider of services; and is making a tremendous impact that can help erase the stigma of these illnesses.



Success Story: Marlene Wright



"I went from hopeless to having so much hope today. I'm back in school, I have my family, and I wake up grateful—not afraid. That's what recovery gave me. That's what Maryville helped me build."

I spent my teenage years drinking and occasionally used marijuana. I enjoyed how alcohol allowed me to escape my life of sexual abuse and being uncomfortable within my body, not realizing it was only causing more problems in the end. When I was 18, I was in a car accident and prescribed medication due to the pain and nerve damage. At this point I was not addicted to the pain or nerve medication, but I believe this opened the door for my addiction.

At 20, I began a relationship, sharing 16 years and two children together. We were toxic in different ways to each other. I was insecure and still numbing past traumas with alcohol. I eventually would discover the man I loved was taking Percocet which led to a heroin addiction. This resulted in abuse, lies, missing money, and frequent fighting, all of which affected our children. My life with him was becoming unmanageable! I reached out to an old friend and I allowed him into my circle for support. I moved back home to my mom's with my children, wanting to make sure they were safe. Newly single with a builtin babysitter, I began spending my time at bars and clubs. One night before going out, I was introduced to cocaine for the first time. I remember how it made me feel and I wanted more, becoming instantly addicted. I became careless of everything that I had going for me at the time. In the beginning, I would only use from Friday through Sunday. The friend and I entered into a relationship based on our addiction. I quickly became dependent on him and the substances.

During COVID, I was laid off from my job, and I continued with drugs and alcohol. One night, I had to take someone who overdosed to the hospital and I lied to the police about what happened. I was then called to the police station and arrested. The consequences didn't stop me; I ran back to using. I received a call from DCP&P (Division of Child Protection and Permanency) offering treatment, and I was sent to a residential treatment program. Upon completion, I was scheduled to go home for the weekend and then a sober living house on Monday. I checked in on Monday and right back out. I was not open to the IOP that was suggested for continuing my treatment. I became homeless, ultimately staying with my sister while a local program called Project

Save tried to help me with my charges and recovery. I was sentenced to Pretrial Intervention by Camden/Gloucester County. I was not ready at this time; I continued in my addiction, experimenting with new substances. My mom finally had enough and took me to court, gaining custody of my children. I acquired more charges and did things I would have never imagined doing. This is when I knew I needed to choose something different and entered Maryville's Intensive Outpatient (IOP) in Vineland.

My counselor was down to earth and still helps me to this day. I was in the program for six months. Through the time at Maryville, I did have a couple of relapses and hid them due to shame. My sister had asked me to leave her home due to my addiction and I stayed in a house that I could not afford and was unsafe. I remember finally telling my mom that I needed to come home and get out of the house. I was going to die if I continue to stay there and use. My mom allowed me to move back, only to rush her to the Jefferson emergency room for COVID the next day. I remained sober during this time for my children's sake and to give


my mom some peace of mind. My mom passed away in March of 2021 and I completed Maryville in May, only to relapse in June. I eventually began acting out old behaviors which made everything worse.

My June relapse woke me up to what recovery can look like. I was forced to move out of my mom's house and became homeless once again, staying with a friend until my mental health started deteriorating and I began hallucinating. I was dodging my probation officer's calls and making every excuse not to show up. The day I took a drive to clear my head was my God moving in my life. I believed I heard the voice of my daughter calling and was afraid to search for her because I was still under the influence. I was losing my sanity and afraid of myself and others at this point. The day after my 38th birthday, I went back for one more run and that night my sister didn't allow me in when I showed up at her house. I drove to Inspira, was admitted, and eventually referred to a shelter. I didn't go because I believed I was better than that. When I was discharged from the hospital, I went to my car and slept until the morning. That day changed my life. I was then accepted into the shelter in Cumberland County and enrolled into Maryville's IOP program again.

Coming back into Maryville, I was not judged! The front office staff were very nice and understanding. Maryville counselors taught me to look at myself and work on my past traumas. My counselor communicated with my probation officer and Project Save and provided them with updates and urinalyses. This time felt different from the first IOP... I listened to others, took advice and started working on myself! I attended a Recovery Gala with amazing people in recovery and I heard HOPE in the room. It gave me hope that my current situation would only be temporary if I continued to stay in recovery. I started to work again while living in the shelter, focusing on myself and what I needed to do to remain sober. I began attending a 12step program and now have a home group and sponsor. I was told service work will help keep me stay sober and to this day, it's true! I went from hopeless to having so much hope today. I lost everything and never imagined having back what I have today and that's all from my God working in my life! My Maryville counselor taught me what HOPE means... hold on, the pain ends! Thank you to all the Maryville staff who have helped in my recovery journey! Beyond grateful for you all. I am nearing my 4th anniversary in recovery!





The Road from Client to Counselor

There was a time in my life when pain, loss, and hopelessness were all I knew. I started using drugs at just 9 years old—smoking marijuana, which quickly escalated into harder substances. It didn't take long before I was using heroin, and that marked the beginning of a long and destructive road that stretched into my 40s.

During those years, I experienced loss on a level that's hard to describe. I lost all three of my brothers—two to drug-related deaths and one in a tragic motorcycle accident. Those losses tore me apart and

drove me deeper into addiction. I cycled in and out of prison and rehab, trying to find peace but never quite breaking free.

At age 40, everything started to shift. I found myself in a Narcotics Anonymous meeting, broken and desperate, but surrounded by people who understood me. That moment lit a spark. Soon after, I went to Maryville for treatment, and for the first time, I surrendered fully and committed to real change.

My turning point came through Recovery Court. It was one of the hardest things I've ever done, but also one of the most life changing. It gave me structure, accountability, and the support I had always needed. I graduated not just clean, but with a renewed sense of purpose.

Today, I am a Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor (CADC). I have the privilege

of working with clients, including those in the very same Recovery Court program that helped save my life. As a liaison, I bridge the gap between the system and the people still trying to find their way out of addiction. I use my lived experience to connect, to guide, and to show others that recovery is possible—no matter how far down someone has gone.

From a 9-year-old kid smoking weed, to a heroin addict behind bars, to a man in long-term recovery with a purpose—I am living proof that transformation is real. I am a counselor, a father, a husband, and an advocate. And if I can change, anyone can

Expanded Funding & Program Growth

Working Side by Side with First Responders

In 2024, Maryville was awarded Burlington County funding to help overdose victims connect to the treatment and supports they need to achieve recovery. Recovery Coaches now work alongside Burlington County First Responders, remaining available 24/7 to respond to overdose calls and to provide six weeks of recovery coaching. This coaching supports individuals in building recovery capital, utilizing external (community services and supports) and internal (skill identification and development) resources.



Physical Health Services Expand at Maryville's Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics

The New Jersey Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services awarded Maryville funding to hire a Nurse Care Manager, Case Manager, and Health Educator for both the Turnersville and Vineland outpatient/Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHCs). Clients now receive medical assessment and/or screening and treatment for illnesses; vaccinations; linkages to other medical providers; and a variety of health measurements including but not limited to blood pressure, cholesterol, diabetes, and much more. They also receive case management services, health education, and personal health and well-being plans.





Maryville Funded to Provide MAT Services to Homeless in Camden

Maryville was granted NJ Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services funding to provide Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) services inside Joseph's House of Camden's homeless shelter, located in Camden City. This increases access to MAT and other supportive services for homeless individuals with an opioid use disorder. Physicians are available in-person and virtually as well as a full-time care manager and peer recovery support specialist. Services are available to shelter residents as well as drop-in guests. Medication assisted treatment is an evidence-based practice that assists individuals with opioid use disorders to achieve and sustain recovery.




Alumni Services Program Receives Grant for Expansion




